

Overview of the course

Effective monitoring and evaluation (M&E) is a prerequisite for results-based, adaptable relevant Programming. The *training workshop on monitoring and evaluation* offers a comprehensive, hands-on guide to current approaches and tools for measuring project progress and results. Participants will refresh their knowledge and skills of the basics of M&E, critically review Theories of Change and results frameworks in preparation for M&E, learn how to plan and collect data for measuring results, improve their skills for interpreting data, learn how to plan and manage an external evaluation, and understand how to effectively communicate findings from M&E to a variety of interested parties.

Participants:

Project officers, project coordinators and **M&E officers** from Non-Governmental Organizations, the United Nations and governmental agencies, wanting to improve or acquire a set of skills and practical knowledge how to effectively monitor and manage evaluations in their day-to-day work.

Learning Methodology

Effective learning requires an **active engagement** of training participants. The workshop will include interactive presentations, practical exercises and case studies. Participants will be asked to select a project they are familiar with and design or improve upon an M&E plan with indicators and data collection methods throughout the five-day workshop. As a result, participants will not only have acquired apply skills and knowledge covered during the workshop, but will also be leaving with an improved **M&E strategy for their own project**(s).
